Parking and Transport

There are two privately operated **car parks** close to Princess Alexandra Hospital:

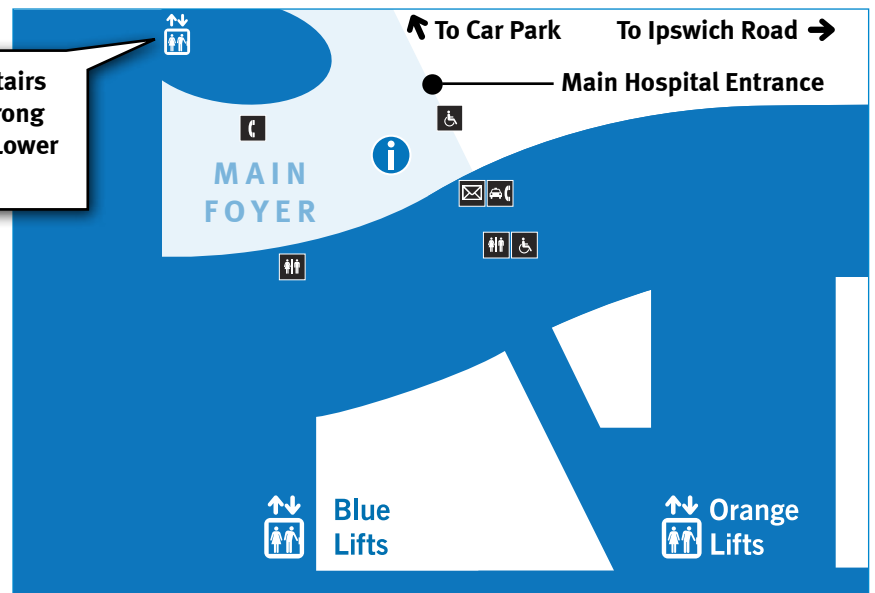
Catering

Kurt Aaron Oration

The annual Kurt Aaron Oration will this year be delivered by Professor Paul Stewart from the University of Birmingham in the UK.

About Dr Kurt Aaron

Dr Kurt Aaron came from Hamburg to Australia to undertake an internship at the Brisbane General (now the Royal Brisbane) Hospital. By 1956, when he was a Senior Visiting Physician to the RBH, Kurt Aaron was appointed as one of the original senior visiting physicians to Princess Alexandra Hospital, newly established as a teaching hospital at South Brisbane. It was there that he displayed his considerable skills in patient care, student teaching, residency training and hospital affairs. He had a particular interest in renal disease and in 1968 was instrumental in obtaining a Kiil dialyser for PAH.



After his retirement as Visiting Physician in 1968, he continued to actively participate in hospital affairs, serving on the South Brisbane Hospitals Board from 1974 to 1979, assuming Chairmanship of the Princess Alexandra Hospital Society in 1973 and continuing as a committee member from 1974-1985, receiving life membership in 1978. In 1976 his work both in medicine and in citizenship was recognised with the award of an O.B.E.

Keynote Speaker: Prof Paul Stewart



Prof Paul Stewart is Dean of Medicine and Deputy Head of College of Medical and Dental Sciences, University of Birmingham. He held a Medical Research Council (MRC) Senior Clinical Fellowship in Birmingham, awarded a personal Chair in Medicine and Fellowship of the Royal College of Physicians of London and in 1999 was elected as a Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences. Paul supervises an active Endocrinology research program supported by The Wellcome Trust, MRC, ERC, NIH and industry) that focuses on corticosteroids. His work is translational and has led to new discoveries in hypertension, obesity, inflammation, osteoporosis and ageing.

Nationally, he serves or has served on Society for Endocrinology committees, Wellcome Trust Molecular and Physiological Sciences Strategy and Capital Investment committees, and is currently Chair of the MRC Clinical panel. Internationally, he has played a leadership role in the US Endocrine Society and is Secretary Treasurer for the International Society of Endocrinology.

He has over 250 original peer reviewed publications and has delivered over 150 plenary/symposium lectures to specialist societies including the RCP Linacre, Goulstonian and Simms lectures, the RCP Graham Bull prize, the Society for Endocrinology Medal Lecture, the Clinical Endocrinology Trust Medal Lecture, Sir George Pickering Medal, and the Clinical Investigator Award Plenary Lecture at The Endocrine Society.
