Ensuring safe access to technology is crucial for women affected by domestic violence—it's essential for them to find help and support, to keep connections to friends and family, and to limit isolation and help them stay in control of day-to-day 'ordinary' living. However, in many cases women who are experiencing emotional and/or physical abuse from a current or former partner also experience technology being used against them, to abuse, control, humiliate and stalk.
